How to Register for Classes

The Winter Term is completely virtual (on Zoom). The registration fee is \$80 for a single-member household and \$130 for a double-member household. Michigan's Quest for Statehood

In January 1837, President Andrew Jackson quietly signed a measure making Michigan the nation's twenty-sixth state. The two-year quest for statehood required Michiganians to succumb to the demands of an unsympathetic Congress. They surrendered a future metropolis that promised to rival New York City in exchange for a remote wilderness that offered little economic promise. Join this Winter Program kickoff class to learn about our Pleasant Pennisula's beginnings.

Roger L. Rosentreter earned his PhD from Michigan State University and now teaches

American History there. From 1988 to 2009, he served as editor of Michigan History Magazine. Recent publications include Michigan: A History of Explorers, Entrepreneurs, and Everyday People, and Grand Rapids and the Civil War. His most recent book, Come On, You Wolverines: Michigan in the Civil War, is scheduled for release in early 2024.

The Real League of Their Own

The All-American Girls Professional Baseball League (AAGPBL), which was made famous by the 1993 film "A League of Their Own," operated between 1943 and 1954, drawing players from across the country and beyond. Professor Smither, who interviewed many former players and coproduced a documentary and a series of short videos based on those interviews, will draw on his material to tell the story of the league and its players, with particular emphasis on teams and players from Michigan.

Dr. Smither holds degrees from the University of

Chicago and Brown University and is Professor of History at Grand Valley State University. He directs the GVSU Veterans History Project, which records and archives oral history interviews with military veterans and others with stories relating to the American experience in wartime. The AAGPBL was a

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Edna Ferber and Elmore Leonard: Two Writers Who Made a Difference

This class will explore two writers central to Michigan's literary legacy. Born in Kalamazoo, Edna Ferber, a Pulitzer Prize-winning author, is best known for her novels, Showboat and Giant. Her work features strong women characters and highlights important secondary characters who faced discrimination. Elmore Leonard spent most of his young life in Detroit, the city in which many of his books are set. Leonard raised the bar on the crime novel by developing his characters fully and by using realistic dialogue.



Sharon O'Brien taught English and Women's Studies at Siena Heights University for 22 years. She began working on the development of SOAR in the mid-1990s and continues to serve on several committees and as the liaison for the Shared Interest Groups.

Made in Michigan: Coney Detroit

Detroit is the world capital of the Coney Island hot dog — a natural-casing hot dog topped with all-meat beanless chili, chopped white onions, and yellow mustard. In this program, Joe Grimm will explore all aspects of Michigan's beloved regional delicacy, which was perfected by Greek immigrants in the early 1900s. While the Coney legend is centered in Detroit, Grimm will explore Coney traditions in many Michigan cities.

Joe Grimm co-authored Coney Detroit with Katherine Yung to answer the question of why Michigan has so many Coney Islands serving this delectable delicacy while so many other states have almost none. They traveled thousands of miles, talked to hundreds of people, and ate a whole lot of Coneys to find



the answer. Joe, a lifelong Detroit-area resident, is now a journalism professor at Michigan State University. With his students or on his own, Joe has published more than 20 books.

Shared Interest Groups, or SIGs are a way for SOAR members to take a deep dive into areas of common interest. SIG small groups are hosted by a SOAR volunteer and typically meet once a month on Zoom to discuss a book, film or issue. More information can be found under the Programming tab on our website.

Detroit Broadcast History

This class will explore the early history of radio in the Detroit area with an emphasis on the 1950s through the1970s. In 1971, Vuolo produced a documentary called "The History of Detroit Radio" ahead of the launch of a new and innovative FM talk station in the Motor City. Mr. Vuolo knows the history of nearly every radio station in SE Michigan and beyond and will discuss them during this class.

Art Vuolo, Jr., a 1969 graduate of Eastern Michigan University, is involved in radio, television, video production, and journalism. While

at EMU, he developed the concept of RADIOGUIDES, designed for people who travel. Since 1972, his company has published over 100 million such guides. Famous radio personality Scott Shannon dubbed him "Radio's Best Friend." He has helped countless people get into the broadcasting



business, is frequently seen as a one-man walking campaign for the radio industry, and believes that being nice to people is still in vogue.

Frontier Arms Race: The Story of the Cannons from the Detroit River

On October 5, 2011, an iron cannon barrel, corroded and covered with zebra mussels, broke the surface of the Detroit River for the first time in many years. Six similar guns had been recovered from the same area since 1984. How and why did they come to be there? Join Dan Harrison as he traces the paths that led to this watery fate. It is a tale of the militarization of the Great Lakes, throughout the turbulent 18th century, as French, Native Americans, British, Canadians, and Americans vied for control of economic resources and strategic waterways.

Dr. Daniel Harrison is a maritime archaeologist

specializing in the Great Lakes region. In 2019, he retired as a reference librarian at Henry Ford College in Dearborn. His research focuses on shipwrecks and submerged sites in southeast Michigan waters. His forthcoming book, Michigan's Venice: The Transformation of the St. Clair Maritime



Cultural Landscape, 1640 - 2000, will be published by Wayne State University Press in Spring 2024. Thursday, Feb 22, 2024, 11:00 AM-12:30 PM

The Vagabonds

Henry Ford, Thomas Edison, Harvey Firestone, and John Burroughs made up the group known as 'The Vagabonds' – a group of famous men who got together to escape their hectic business lives by taking off for a week or two. Each personality brought different skills and insights to the outings. Presidents of the United States were occasionally guests of the group. These famous get-togethers were photographed and well documented. This presentation will include seldom-seen images of and interesting stories about these famous trips.

Robert Kreipke is Ford Motor Company's Corporate



Historian Emeritus. Bob's career at Ford included the production of award-winning films, videotapes, and live shows, as well as overseeing executive strategic planning. Bob has authored four international books – Ford Motor Company, the First 100 Years; The Model T; Faces of Henry

Ford; and The Ford Model A. In addition, Bob has directed various nationally recognized films, including award-winning documentaries shown on PBS.

This class will explore these award-winning artists to find their common ground and discover how the pulse of Detroit drove their musical language.

Rochelle Rosenthal Forester has had a lifelong



love of music, theater, and performance. A member of Actors Equity and SAG, she frequently performed at The Attic Theater, JET Theater and Michigan Opera. Now retired, she enjoys researching and sharing her love of learning with others. Forester is married and has an adult daughter.

The Art of the Cass Corridor

The Wayne State University Art Collection (UAC) is used to educate, inspire, foster creative thinking, and promote the advancement of social and cultural leadership. Founded in 1968, the collection has grown to over 7500 works of art that celebrate Detroit artists. It features the most comprehensive collection of Detroit's famed "Cass Corridor," a countercultural art movement that flourished at and around the university during the mid-1960s to late-1970s. Many artists in this collection have become some of the most prominent visual artists to emerge from Detroit and have joined the international conversation on contemporary art. The presentation will also show how the UAC is expanding to be more inclusive and representative of Detroit artists beyond the Cass Corridor.

Grace Serra is the Art Collection Curator at

Wayne State University and Exhibition Curator at the University of Michigan North Campus Research Complex. Serra has served as an adjunct faculty at Henry Ford College, Macomb Community College, Eastern Michigan University, and Wayne State University, teaching visual arts, art



history, and arts administration courses. She holds

a BFA (Painting) from Wayne State University; an MA (Painting) from Dominican University in Florence, Italy; and an MA (Arts Administration) from Eastern Michigan University. Tuesday, March 5, 2024, 11:00 AM-12:30 PM

Michigan's Freedom Fighters in the **Underground Railroad**

Before the Civil War, a number of Michiganders fought the tyranny of slavery by direct involvement in the Underground Railroad. This has often been called one of the greatest modern examples of human compassion in U.S. history. This course examines the actions and impact of those prominent Michiganders who risked all to make America a more free and just society.



Dr. Fred L. Johnson, III, is the Guy Vander Jagt '53 Endowed Professor of History at Hope College in Holland, Michigan. Prior to his career in academia. Dr. Johnson served as Communications-Electronics and Infantry Officer in the United States Marine Corps (and Marine Reserves).

The Murder Trial of Jack Kevorkian: **A Personal Retrospective**

Compassion for the dying, including the propriety of assisted suicide, is an issue faced by every culture in the world. In the 1990s, Jack Kevorkian was Michigan's most famous assisted-suicide advocate. In April 1999, Kevorkian was prosecuted for murder in Oakland County. This presentation will discuss the trial and the legal, ethical, and practical issues involved in the case, as well as the lasting impact of the verdict. The story will be told from the perspective of one of the trial prosecutors involved.

Daniel L. Lemisch is the General Counsel of



Lakeview Capital, Inc. Prior to joining Lakeview. Mr. Lemisch served in the United States Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of Michigan as the Acting United States Attorney, First Assistant United States Attorney, and Chief of the Criminal Division. Prior to joining the US Attorney's

Office, Mr. Lemisch was with the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office in Pontiac as a trial lawyer

and Chief of Appeals. Mr. Lemisch also practiced civil law in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, where he specialized in commercial litigation.

Celebrating 50 Years of the Detroit Film Theatre

Join the founder of film programming at the Detroit Institute of Arts, Elliot Wilhelm, as he reflects on the past 50 years of the Detroit Film Theatre (DFT) and a history of Michigan-related movies. In a lively one-on-one format, fellow WSU instructor of Media Arts and Studies, Karen McDevitt, will ask Elliot about the movies he's screened, the film festivals he's attended, and the people he's met over the past five decades.

Informally known as the "Detroit movie guy,"



and before that as the kid who started the Wayne (State) Cinema Guild, Elliot Wilhelm has been the director of the Detroit Film Theatre series at the Detroit Institute of Arts since 1973, and Curator of Film at the DIA since 1984.

Karen McDevitt has been teaching for Wayne

State University's Media Arts and Studies program for over 20 years. She served on the Board of Directors of the Friends of Detroit Film Theatre for 10 years, and currently serves as a member of the Editorial Board of Directors for Wayne State University Press.
